Talking Points and Calls to Action

Interested in ideas on how to support survivors throughout the entire year? Here are some talking points when educating about advocacy and ideas for welcoming more voices at the table:

- What does "Next Era Activism" mean to you and why is it important to center this theme during Sexual Assault Awareness Month?
- Sexual assault is not isolated and is connected to more than other types of violence, especially during times of familial, community, and societal instability.
- Last year, the Governor and California Legislature included \$103 million in funding for crime victim services across the state, demonstrating how support services are essential to all communities in California. Share how this funding has helped sexual assault survivors, supported your community, and allowed you to continue to work to end sexual violence.
- Sexual violence affects all parts of our communities, impacting schools, campuses, families, workplaces, and more. By engaging youth in conversations about healthy relationships we are working toward promoting consensual relationships and non-violent behaviors.
- Prevention initiatives are needed to slow the rates of sexual assault, helping to stop sexual assault before it occurs, leaving more resources to support survivors, and create safer communities.
- Support from the legislature through funding means accessible support for survivors after experiencing sexual violence.
 - » We are able to continue providing therapeutic services for survivors and supporting survivors as they navigate their healing process.

A New Class of Legislators

This year, California has welcomed a large cohort of new members in the State's Assembly and Senate. For those who have not yet, this is a perfect opportunity to welcome our new or re-elected members and invite them to visit your organizations. Our elected legislators represent survivors and communities who deserve to be heard and supported. Their visits are also an opportunity to highlight how important prevention is in our communities! 

Ideas on how to show prevention include:

- 1. **Invite your representatives** and their staff to tour the facilities and discuss how survivors can access supportive services.
- 2. **Tell stories** on how services for survivors provided crucial safety nets for those who experienced sexual violence in the community.
- 3. **Share quotes** from youth on how prevention education has helped them understand positive interactions and healthy relationships.
- 4. **Inform with statistics** on the impacts of prevention education funding and direct service funding within your organization.
 - a. General data for California
 - i. In 2022, sexual assault resulted in \$4.8 billion in tangible costs for California. (Newcomb Institute, Center on Gender Equity and Health)
 - 1. Tangible costs = medical costs, police expenses, legal fees, and response program expenses.
 - ii. 816,000 Californians sought services from crisis centers in 2023. (California Office of Emergency Services, CalOES)
 - iii. In 2023, more than 1.5 million women and 900,000 men in California were victims of sexual harassment or assault. (CalVEX 2023)
- 5. **Invite your representatives** and their staff to attend a prevention event that you hold for your community.

Denim Day commemorates the day women in the Italian Parliament came to work wearing jeans in solidarity with a survivor after the Italian Supreme Court overturned a rape conviction. The justices believed that because the survivor's jeans were tight, she must have helped remove them, therefore implying consent.
